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# Solid Waste Enforcement Team

During this month a total of 159 activities related to solid waste and recycling were completed by the staff.

- **1.** <u>Facility Inspections:</u> A total of 50 various recycling, disposal, and transfer facilities were inspected resulting in no violation observed.
- 2. <u>Solid Waste Investigations and Complaints:</u> MCHD inspected a total of 37 solid waste transport units (garbage trucks, compactors and roll-off dumpsters), with 1 violation observed. Additionally, 2 complaints were investigated.
- **3.** Recycling Compliance Inspections: Staff conducted 70 recycling field inspections with 1 violation observed.

# Hazardous Materials Response Program

**APRIL 2023** 

Our unit responded to a total of Four (4) hazmat incidences/complaints for the month of April 2023. In addition, twenty four (24) OPRA requests for property searches were processed by the staff. The highlights are as follows:

On April 1<sup>st</sup> MCHD was requested into Wall township for an aircraft crash which resulted in a release of jet fuel. MCHD made an initial inspection and due to the aircrafts position and incoming severe weather a decision was made to hold off on moving the plane and removing fuel until the morning of April 2<sup>nd</sup>. On April 2<sup>nd</sup>, MCHD along with aircraft mechanics, transferred all remaining fuel, ensured proper storage of fuel, and ensured that the plane was safely removed from the crash site.





On April 1<sup>st</sup> while finishing up at Monmouth Executive airports fuel spill, MCHD was requested into Tinton Falls to assist Police and Fire with an apparent chemical suicide. MCHD performed monitoring of the scene to ensure safe victim removal and performed proper packaging of chemicals for proper disposal.

All other complaints were routinely handled.

# Air and Noise Program

The Air and Noise Program investigates all air pollution complaints received from citizens and NJDEP. These complaint investigations include, but are not limited to, open burning, odors, particulate emissions/smoke, permits and certificates, and motor vehicle idling. Complaints referred by NJDEP must be investigated within 24 hours of receipt unless a more immediate response is warranted based upon NJDEP review.

The staff holds certificates in odor, noise and visible emissions issued by the Rutgers Air Pollution Program. During this month, the Air and Noise Program investigated 2 NJDEP referrals. No violations found.

In addition, the Air and Noise Program conducts minor source compliance inspections at facilities that utilize boilers < 20 million BTU/hr., emergency generators, woodworking equipment (at schools), degreasers, waste oil burners, mobile equipment refinishing, auto body shops, government buildings, schools, office buildings, apartment buildings, as well as dry cleaners. Each year the Air Program is required to meet a quota of inspections set by the NJDEP.

# COVID-19

The COVID-19 pandemic is still an important part of the Monmouth County Health Department throughout April.

- In April, the Monmouth County Health Department held 8 Covid-19 vaccination clinics with a total 48 vaccines provided.
- The collaborative clinic at Brookdale Community College ended on March 28, 2023. The
  collaboration which included Monmouth County, RJW Barnabus and Brookdale College. The
  Brookdale clinic has been relocated to the Monmouth County Health Department at 50 East
  Main Street Freehold from 4 to 6 pm. Vaccines are also being given at the sites located in
  Neptune, Asbury Park, Howell, and Middletown as well as at pop-up clinics throughout the
  county.
- Testing continued throughout April with 8 clinics at 8 testing sites. The Monmouth County Health Department tested 7 people.
- Case investigation and contact tracing for Covid-19 continued but will end in May 2023. We continued to utilize contract tracers from the New Jersey Department of Health.

#### **Home Bound Vaccination**

The Monmouth County Health Department continued to vaccinate homebound residents of Monmouth County with the Covid-19 vaccine. The department received requests via NJ Department of Health Office of Local Public Health Regional Hotspot Coordinator, the health department email, and calls directly made to the Monmouth County Health Department. The Monmouth County Medical Reserve Corps was utilized to vaccinate residents who were deemed homebound with the vaccine they required. For the month of April, 1 resident was vaccinated.

# Lyme Disease

### <u>Tickborne-Lyme Disease</u>

Tickborne/Lyme disease is an illness caused by bacteria that is carried by ticks. This infection can cause a variety of symptoms. Tick borne/Lyme diseases are reportable with 48 hours of diagnosis to the local health department. The Communicable Disease Reporting Surveillance System (CDRSS) facilitates the data reporting. Positive laboratory reports are entered into CDRSS by an established lab daily. The NJSHD through CDRSS transmits all Tickborne/Lyme's disease investigation data to the Centers for Disease Control for a statewide surveillance.

The Monmouth County Health Department, Field Representative, accesses and investigates all positive Tickborne/ Lyme disease cases. The NJDOH Tickborne/ Lyme disease case investigation clinical information, risk factors and treatments, are entered into CDRSS data base, and cases are confirmed and closed.

# **Tuberculosis Control Clinic**

For the month of April 2023, the Monmouth County Health Department provided complete and ongoing case management to 6 active tuberculosis cases, monitoring of 11 contacts to active cases including screenings, evaluations, and treatment.

The Monmouth County Tuberculosis Control program provided assessment and monitoring of "Direct Observation Therapy" performed by its own department as well as local health departments to active tuberculosis cases in the various communities to maintain compliance with the New Jersey Department of Health standard of Care.

The Department provided tuberculosis exposure testing on site to several families upon their recent exposure.

TB-70 reports on all active tuberculosis cases and TB-41 reports on ongoing "Contact Investigations" were updated and forwarded to New Jersey Department of Health to comply with protocol.

Some of the many tasks included communicating with local hospitals and other medical facilities, educating, and addressing issues within the diverse Monmouth County communities, scheduling appointments for evaluations, running clinics, providing screenings and assessments as needed, monitoring of ongoing treatment regimens.

## **Outbreaks**

Monmouth County Health Department (MCHD) was notified of four disease outbreaks in long-term care facilities and two disease outbreaks in school settings in April 2023. Out of these six total outbreaks, two were related to COVID-19, three were gastrointestinal illnesses, and one was for Strep. In conjunction with the New Jersey Department of Health (NJDOH), MCHD provided recommendations to the facilities and has been conducting surveillance for additional cases.

### Salmonella Outbreak Linked to Flour

On April 28, 2023, General Mills issued a voluntary recall for some of their Gold Medal flour products because they may be potentially contaminated with

Salmonella infantis, a specific strain of Salmonella bacteria that can lead to intestinal illness. Common symptoms include diarrhea, nausea, and vomiting.

Since December 2022, there have been 13 people infected with this specific strain of *Salmonella* across 12 states, including New Jersey. Three hospitalizations and zero deaths have been reported. FDA conducted a traceback investigation to locate a potential contamination source and identified a production facility in Missouri where this specific outbreak strain was detected in a flour sample. CDC recommends throwing away any recalled flour products and to refrain from consuming any raw products with flour.

The MCHD Communicable Disease team continues to investigate reported cases of Salmonella as well as following up on any suspected gastrointestinal outbreaks in the community.

### **Tick-borne Disease Awareness Month**

Governor Murphy recently issued a proclamation that May is Tick-borne Disease Awareness Month. Although ticks can be active throughout the whole year, May is a good time to remind everyone that tick season is arriving since they are most active during the warmer months.

In 2019, there were over 3,600 reported Lyme disease cases in New Jersey, which was the 3<sup>rd</sup> highest number of cases reported in the nation. Ticks that are in their nymph stage can be particularly dangerous since they're about the size of a poppy seed allowing them to bite humans undetected.

If you ever find a tick attached to your body, it's recommended to use fine-tipped tweezers to grasp the tick as close to the skin's surface as possible. Then pull upward with steady pressure. After removing the tick, clean the bite area and your hands with rubbing alcohol or soap and water.

# **Mosquito Control Division**

# **April 2023**

## **Monthly Statistics**

### **Mosquito Control**

- As of April 30, the Division has received 24 Requests for Service from the public of which 18 were received in April. Inspectors have conducted 13 inspections related to these requests. Of these, 5 were found supporting larvae and were treated.
- In April, 132 larviciding sites were inspected with most activity occurring in the western zone of the county. This is typical in the spring where water lies in woods and floodplains before trees leaf out and temperatures warm sooner than the coast.
- Aerial operations to treat western airblocks began on April 6. Inspectors checked over 90 airblocks and gave the pilot lists to treat. With significant rainfall, missions were flown April 11-12 and April 23-25 and 28. In April, 13040 lbs of Vectobac GS were applied to 3,260 acres. This amount is consistent with 2021 but close to double the area treated in April 2022.
- Significant rainfall (3-6.5 inches) over the weekend of April 28-30 has left standing water in most freshwater airblocks and larviciding hot spots. Luckily cooler temperatures are slowing development. Aerial operations commenced on Wednesday, May 2 but warmer temperatures next week could result in mosquitoes emerging.
  - ULV machines for adult mosquito control have been calibrated.

### Mosquito Surveillance

- Larval surveillance and identification began in April
- NJ Light Traps were installed at 16 locations with daily collections beginning May 2. Four additional traps will be installed at NWSE when security clearances are finalized.
- 50 Resting boxes were placed at the Turkey Swamp site. Five of these plywood boxes will be randomly replaced with plastic versions as part of a statewide comparison trials. RB collections will begin during the second week of May.

Vector surveillance preparations have been completed with the mixing of an initial batch of "stinkwater" infusion bait for the gravid traps and delivery of dry ice for CDC traps. Mosquitoes seeking water to lay eggs are attracted to the organic water and those looking for a bloodmeal are attracted to the CO2.

### Tick-borne disease Management Program

- Spring surveillance for adult deer ticks continues at Hartshorne Woods and Manasquan Reservoir
  where Bourbon virus had been detected. Adult specimens of deer tick, dog tick and lone star ticks
  have been collected. Deer tick and Asian longhorn tick nymphs are beginning to show up in surveys
  as well. May and June are historically the months of concern for nymphal ticks which can carry
  pathogens and easily go undetected.
- Through the end of March, the public have submitted 73 ticks, about 20% below the long-term (2006-2022) average for this point in the year), but equal to the average for the last 5 years (75.0 ± 7.8).

### **Public Education**

- May is Tick-borne Diseases Awareness Month
- The Division had information tables at Bradley Beach festival on April 22 and Healthy Kids Day in Red Bank.
- Arrangements were made to place tick education displays at 4 county libraries that have room for such. Educational brochures were distributed to several other libraries.
- Several print orders have been submitted to restock brochure inventories for upcoming events.

## **Special Projects/Initiatives**

- The Division completed and submitted the documentation needed to participate in the State
  Mosquito Control Commission's Airspray Program. As we are fortunate to have our own aerial
  application program, our participation serves as a back-up should the helicopter or pilot be out of
  commission for an extended period.
- RIMS staff continue to scan Mosquito Extermination Commission records requiring permanent retention (payroll, general ledger) into the RIMS system.
- Several boxes of non-permanent records of the Mosquito Extermination Commission were destroyed after receiving State approval.
- Expired pesticides and golf cart batteries used for BGS traps were disposed of at Household Hazardous Waste.

# **Major Operational Updates**

- An Intergovernmental Services Agreement with Naval Weapons Station Earle for the Division to
  provide mosquito surveillance and control services in 2023 was authorized by the County Board of
  County Commissioners and was sent to NWSE for signature.
- The Mosquito Control Division is participating in Workforce Development's Summer Youth Program with 5 employees qualifying for the program.

Great progress has been made with the mosquito control inspection database app with the essential monthly reporting function now available for the 2023 season.

## Challenges, Gaps, Barriers, Resident Needs

All mosquito control seasonal positions have been conditionally filled. To date, only two seasonals
are scheduled to begin on May 15. Processing of candidates by HR has been extremely slow with
candidates interviewed in early April still awaiting conditional employment letters. While HR
staffing shortages are to blame, delays in bringing seasonal employees on board will impact our
control operations. Hopefully the majority of seasonals will be on board by June 1.

# Registered Environmental Health Specialists

Retail Inspection Definitions of Risk Types:

**Risk Type 1 Food Establishment** is any retail food establishment that:

- 1. Serves or sells only prepackaged, non-potentially hazardous foods
- 2. Prepares only non-potentially hazardous foods OR
- 3. Heats only commercially processed potentially hazardous foods for hot holding and does not cool potentially hazardous foods. Such retail establishments may include, but are not limited to, convenience store operations, hot dog carts, coffee shops.

**Risk Type 2 Food Establishment** is any retail food establishment that has a limited menu and:

- 1. Prepares, cooks, and serves most products immediately
- 2. Exercises hot and cold holding of potentially hazardous foods after preparation or cooking OR
- 3. Limits the complex preparation of potentially hazardous foods, including the cooking, cooling, and reheating for hot holdings, to two or fewer items. Such retail establishments may include but are not limited to: retail food store operations, schools that do not serve a highly susceptible population, and quick service operations, depending on the menu and preparation procedures.

Prepares and serves potentially hazardous foods including the extensive handling of raw ingredients and whose primary service population is a highly **Risk Type 3 Food Establishment** is any retail food establishment that:

- Has an extensive menu which requires the handling of raw ingredients and is involved in the complex preparation of menu items that includes the cookies, cooling, and reheating of at least three or more potentially hazardous foods

  OR
- 2. susceptible population. Such establishments may include, but are not limited to, full-service restaurants, diners, commissaries, and catering operations or hospitals, nursing homes, and preschools preparing and serving potentially hazardous foods.

**Risk Type 4 Food Establishment** is a retail food establishment that conducts specialized processes such as smoking, curing, canning, bottling, acidification designed to control pathogen proliferation, or any reduced oxygen packaging intended for extended shelf-life where such activities may require the assistance of a trained food technologist. Such establishments include those conducting specialized processing at retail.
